60 Rolls-Royce coming to Derby







From the moment my mum handed me a bag of toilet roll tubes and empty cereal boxes I've been re-inventing the tired and old into something unique, beautiful (more so in later years) and desirable. I practiced painting, drawing and sculpture at every opportunity from being super small until I went to France, seven years ago.

While refurbishing a Bistro for a friend, I began to learn my trade from a very experienced lady who showed me how to bring life to the forgotten gems that we found in charity shops, and that our customers asked us to refurbish, repair and up-cycle alongside our gardening business. She taught me how to splice slithers of wood into cracked table tops, strip varnish from beautiful old oak and paint with every technique she knew.

Included in this is furniture art, where I can add bespoke twists either by freehand or with stencils to your pieces or pieces that I sell on social media. I've been learning upholstery for the past year, and while I can't yet upholster your sofa, I can upholster chairs, stools and footstools.



Inn Focus: Cock Inn, Muggington

Our photographs show the truly remarkable transformation of the Cock Inn, Muggington, from dereliction to ultra-smart bar and eatery. Ten years of neglect and decay had clearly taken its toll on the pub but it's reopening in November 2016 was met with universal laudation.

First, though, a little history. Back in the 18th and 19th centuries the Cock Horse Inn was on a turnpike section of Bullhurst Hill which was a section of the main route between London and Manchester via Derby. The steep gradient necessitated

extra horsepower so strong "Cock Horses" were hired and stabled here. The site had a duality of purpose, being a toll bar as well as an inn, and the stables housing the strong horses were demolished in the 1960s. The Cock was once

a purveyor of Derby Offiler's ales, and became a freehouse in the 1970s, but not one that today's CAMRA member would recognise as atop the bar were a cluster of colourful plastic boxes dispensing myriad keg beers, many mercifully







consigned to history. In the 1990s, it built an enviable reputation for good quality food accompanied by real ale but the premises gradually fell into decline, finally closing in 2006.

Berkeley Inns, who have a small chain of local, revitalised establishments, acquired the forlorn looking building, and instigated an imaginative, comprehensive overhaul which included a huge extension with a south facing, glazed gable end that has far reaching views over the countryside towards distant Derby. A quarry tiled floor, representing the last vestige of the original inn, in the bar area,

has been revealed after carpets were ripped up. Since reopening in 2016, the site has continued to be developed commensurate with burgeoning patronage and The Cock was declared county winner in the National Pub and Bar Awards 2018. An innovative culinary menu has attracted custom from far and wide, and a unique feature here are the garden rooms which make for private al fresco dining. These have proved so popular that in July, reservations were full until November. Inside the Cock, there is a choice of the following hand-pulled beers: Thornbridge Jaipur, Taylor's Landlord, Marston's Pedigree, and a house beer

brewed by Greene King, Berkeley IPA. During lockdown, the inn innovated by opening the "village store" which sold fresh produce and a wide variety of meals.

The Cock Inn is situated near the top of the long hill up from Weston Underwood and today it's served not by Cock Horses but by the 114 bus between Ashbourne and Derby! There's a quiz night every Sunday from 8.00pm so if you're out this way you can see a pub that has really risen phoenix-like from the ashes.

Meet The Local Licensees Who Have Stood The Test of Time

In the 1970s, prospective Marston's tenants had to wait up to eight years to secure a tenancy, such was the popularity of the Burton brewery's pubs. A decade on, the 1989 Beer Orders Act had profound and far-reaching consequences which resonate to this day. The Act mandated Britain's Big Six breweries to shed thousands of pubs which led to the creation of many pub companies. Today, some pubs change hands with almost bewildering frequency, but there is, however, a cohort of longserving, single pub licensees who have bucked the trend and we recognise them here.



Derby's longest serving licensee is Tony Williams at The Bless, Chapel Street, whose been here ever since it opened in the mid 70s. For many of those years, Tony's been in charge and inevitably he's overseen change which includes considerable expansion but also the closure of Ben Bowers restaurant which once occupied the first floor. From the off, the Blessington Carriage as it was originally named has served real ale and it's moved with the times with students being integral to a diverse customer base. Good Beer Guide recognition came in the early 1980s, hardly surprising given that the brilliant new Burton Bridge Bitter was sold here, selling like hot cakes. The Blessington was an early pioneer of pub beer festivals, and Tony's pictured (second from left, back) at one of his festivals in the 1980s. Today, there's always something on the bar to appeal to real ale drinkers and there's a keen focus on food

Steve and Jan Birkin had run the J F Kennedy, Chaddesden, and the classic Coopers Tavern, Burton, before

buying the freehold to the **Rowditch Inn** at the junction of Uttoxeter Old and New Roads in 1997. Perennially Good Beer Guide listed for the last 20 years, Steve and Jan operate a truly traditional public house where most customers are known by name. Beers are brewed on site and a couple of these vie for attention

with a guest and Pedigree, probably the best Pedi you'll get in Derby. Steve and Jan, who have raised considerable sums for charity, take great pride in



their "secret garden" which is a quiet, colourful haven in summer. Sadly, there aren't many pubs like this left.

Jim Harris took over the Olde Dolphin Inne, Queen Street, at the end of 2002,

and Derby's oldest inn naturally features in Britain's Best Real Heritage Pubs, a CAMRA publication. Many will be familiar with the Cathedral Quarter gem, with four rooms coalescing around the tiny bar

servery. Food is always available and the steak restaurant upstairs opens on certain evenings. The passageway between the kitchen and snug

> was once a public thoroughfare but now leads to the rear patio which has an annual



beer festival in July. This reinforces Jim's commitment to real ale which sees Draught Bass and Abbot having changing guest beers for company all year round.

Jim Hallows and Steph Briggs acquired the lease to the Falstaff, Silver Hill Road, Normanton, in 2003 and immediately began rebuilding and rewiring the brewhouse to revive brewing which had begun in millennium year. A range of Falstaff beers is brewed and, like the Rowditch, sold at very reasonable prices. This atmospheric, Victorian corner local is full of character and characters with the Offiler's lounge being a shrine to the Derby brewery's memorabilia and is not to be missed. Listed in every edition of the Good Beer Guide since

In 1997, J D Wetherspoon converted Allied Carpets on Babington Lane into the Babington Arms, echoing the name of the long-gone pub that stood at the top of the hill, and subsequently Tom Taylor became manager. It's another Good Beer Guide regular, understandably so given that it has one of the largest ranges of real ale and traditional cider in the city, all of which are displayed on a large screen that's constantly updated to aid selection. The usual Wetherspoon accoutrements

> feature and our photograph shows Tom (right) receiving the 2005 Derby CAMRA Pub of the Year award from Derby CAMRA Chairman, the late Ian Winterton.

Around the corner at The Spot, Steve

Kirk has been plying his trade at the Neptune for the past two decades. The former Offiler's house is a firm favourite with Rams' fans who meet here on match day Saturday mornings for sustenance before boarding a coach to away games. Naturally

there's some great Rams' memorabilia including a large, autographed photograph of the late, great Dave Mackay, and there's even a turnstile from the Baseball Ground out at the back. Last year, Steve together with his regular customers raised





a tremendous £16,690 for the Royal British Legion's poppy appeal.

Travelling along Ashbourne Road, Derby, it's hard to miss the handsome, white stuccoed, grade 2 listed Georgian House Hotel which is a fine example of Regency-style architecture. Within is **Mr Grundy's Tavern** which has been run by **Carl Haspel and his business partner, Louise Kamp**, since



they bought the entire premises in the early 2000s. It was built around the time of the Battle of Waterloo (1815) for a naval contemporary of Horatio Nelson, and later in the 19thC, a governor at the nearby Derby gaol lived here. Clifford Grundy was born in 1897 and his family ran Grundy's provisions on King Street, Derby. He fought for the Notts and Derby Regiment (Sherwood Foresters) in WW1, later receiving the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. The Stanton family ran the hotel when Clifford Grundy sadly died in 1991 and after conversion of his home to a bistro style establishment, the Stanton's gained an on licence and respected Clifford's memory by naming the new pub Mr Grundy's Tavern which opened in 1996. It was fitted out by Hardy and Hanson (Kimberley) brewery in highly characterful style. The transition to a public house saw a 2.5 tonne red telephone kiosk being manoeuvred in on wheels and the panelled walls are covered in photographs of old film



stars and other celebrities. Not long after Carl and Louise's acquisition, a brewery was installed with Mr Grundy's WW1 themed beers brewed in gleaming stainless-steel vessels made in Derby. Also, Carl has his own cider produced in Ockbrook available. It's strong though, so halves may be advisable! The generous sized garden at the rear has been enhanced with a Victorian terrace topped by a wrought iron canopy overlooking a weeping willow on the lawn. Themed food evenings form part of a substantial culinary offering and there's a specials board. A large car park exists to the rear.

Trevor and Nadine Price have run the Masons Arms, The Square, in Mickleover old village since 2000. From the main road, it's easily identifiable by the distinctive Dutch gable and inside there are two rooms on different levels. At the back is a south facing, stone-flagged raised terrace on which to enjoy your drinks in fine weather. Nadine cooks some tasty dishes on themed food evenings.



Further out on the A516 on the edge of Etwall, **Fred and Rachael Pruden** have managed the Seven Wells ever since Hardy and Hanson (Kimberley) brewery opened it as a new-build in 2000. Undeterred by Greene King's takeover in 2006, Fred and Rachael have successfully combined running a family orientated pub with sating the thirst of discerning drinkers by offering a quartet of well-kept ales. The steak dishes are highly recommended.

Nick Thompson has run the John Thompson, Ingleby, for upwards of fifteen years, following in the footsteps of his parents whose 15thC home was granted an on-licence in 1969. It was here in 1977 that Derbyshire's brewing revived and hand-pulled, home brewed beer still takes pride of place on the bar, behind which Nick's parents, John and Ann, are pictured. Set in acres of grounds with modern holiday lets, this quintessential family pub has all of the requisite facilities for holidaying in south Derbyshire.



North of Derby, in the attractive and historic village of Milford, **Dave Sutton** has been pulling pints at the King William since 2005. During Dave's reign, the stone-built pub has frequently featured in the Good Beer Guide, and Saturday night live music brings punters in from far and wide as do the hugely popular, occasional Sunday soul sessions. Accommodation is available.

Roger and Frances Creighton have, since 2004, made the Old Oak Inn a must visit pub on Main Street, Horsley Woodhouse. In 2009, the Oak earned recognition way beyond its Amber Valley hinterland by qualifying for the last 16 pubs in CAMRA's national Pub of the Year competition. Quite an achievement for a pub that had closed in the post-Home Brewery (Nottingham) era. It has the unusual distinction of being the brewery tap for not one, but two local breweries, namely Bottle Brook and Leadmill. At weekends, choice abounds when the RuRAD real ale bar offers extra ales. There's a homely, lived in ambience here and the premises are considerably expanded from their original function as a farmhouse.



Mind you, no one can match Olive Wilson's record of longevity at the Royal Oak, Ockbrook. Olive moved to the village pub with husband, Lew, in 1953. Lew predeceased Olive a while back but Olive and her family carried on until she sadly died last year. The Royal Oak has a record beyond compare with multiple Pub of the Year awards and 43 consecutive appearances in the Good Beer Guide. Over the years the Ockbrook pub has become a byword for beer and culinary excellence, continuing to thrive today under the stewardship of Steve Hornbuckle, Olive's son in law.

For Rolls-Royce the 1970's had been a period of flux and rebuilding. The problems that had occurred in the early 1970's with the RB211 eventually causing the business many problems and resulting in it being nationalised by the then British government. However the 1980's saw Rolls-Royce end its control by the government and return to the stock market. The 1980's was a period where Rolls-Royce was started to rebuild confidence in itself and the business.

In its aero engine business
Rolls-Royce continued to
develop the RB211 leading to
the RB211-535 and subsequently
theRB211- 535 E4, development
and build of these engines still
being concentrated on Derby.
The RB199 for the Panavia Tornado
and Adour programmes for the
SEPECAT Jaguar continued to
play important role in the defence
business alongside other existing
work and new development
such as the EJ200 which was
developed for the Eurofighter.

The 1980's saw Rolls-Royce continue develop colorations with its defence work, with BMW and in a new venture called International Engines (IAE). The main product of IAE was theV2500 which saw service in the Airbus A320 amongst other aircraft types.

1989 saw Rolls-Royce started expand outside the core aero engines business when acquired Amalgamated Power Engineering, a process that continued to present day with acquisition's such as Vickers plc and parts of MTU.


The end of the period saw the Rolls-Royce board make the decision to invest in a replacement for the RB211, which became the famous Trent Civil aero engine. The Trent, like the RB211 before it, changed the fortunes of Rolls-Royce and laid the bases of its current success. By the end of the 1980's Rolls-Royce had changed from Rolls-Royce (1971) Ltd to Rolls-Royce plc, it retuned to the stock market in 1987 and it was back on the pathway of success.



Rolls-Royce RB211-535 engine was the further development of the RB211 and the E4 version was finial version of the engine. The RB211-535 E4 came into service in the early 1990's but the RB211-535 version saw service in 1980's on the Boeing 757 amongst others.

Rolls-Royce Gem aero engine. As well as the main civil engine work, work continued at various Rolls-Royce sites on other engine products. The Gem aero engine was made at the Rolls-Royce Leavesden site near London and powered the Lynx helicopter.



The IAE V2500 was collaboration effort of which Rolls-Royce was partner and entered service in 1988. International Aero Engines was a partnership that Rolls-Royce joined in 1983 along with Pratt & Whitney, MTU and Japanese Aircraft Corporation.

In 1987 Rolls-Royce returned to the stock market after a period of 16 years under state ownership. Rolls-Royce plc was born.

The Market Place was the location of Derby's Market until it was moved in the 1930's to a site with permanent stalls located between the Bus Station and Council House as part of Charles Aslin's plans in the 1930's to re-develop the Riverside-Morledge area. The Market later moved into the Eagle Centre in the late 1970's.




These pictures are just a few of the ones we have on the Picture the Past website and show both the Old and the New Assembly Rooms in Derby. Built in 1752-5 by the London Architect, Matthew Habershon. Assembly rooms were built all over the country and served the genteel middle-classes as social meeting rooms to see and be seen within society. They held music recitals and dances and dress codes and manners were strictly controlled. The building was gutted by fire in 1963 and the the 5 bay stone facade to the building was demolished and re-erected at Crich Tramway Museum in the 1970's (sadly the beautiful interior was lost forever). It was replaced in 1977 by the New Assembly Rooms in the Civic Centre complex also pictured.



Richard currently resides at a care home in Findern Derbyshire, where he has done some talks about his life for the other residents who enjoy the talks. Here are some of Richard's Memories of his life a car eer that eventually led to him residing here in Derbyshire.

EARLY LIFE

I was in the boy scouts, he remembers Bob a Job week, and the tasks that people asked of them, such as mowing and digging for a shilling which he thought was a measly amount. Then as I grew up, I took up freshwater fishing, catching pike, bream and perch which were lethal if handled the wrong way as they had a spine which could cause a nasty nip. I then went canoeing with a lady named Taylor who became Governor of Holloway prison, the first female commissioner of the entire prison service. It was ironic as that was my career for 30 years, I never saw her again with moving about but was an honour to have known Dr Charity Taylor.

LIFE AS A COUNTY POLICEMAN

I enjoyed being a county policeman, it was duri ng this time that I met my future wife, she persuaded me to move to Birmingham as she was a hairdresser in Birmingham. Ric hard decided to move and in 1957 I was sworn in as a policeman on the Saturday morning and married in the afternoon, we were married 58 happy years, after which she sadly died. Life in Birmingham was good, I was allocated a police house. As a County policeman you were not over popular with the city compatriot who saw themselves a cut above county coppers.

NEXT POSTING

One day I was walking the beat when I was told to report to the Chief Constable, wondering if I had done anything wrong, although I could think of nothing, so I strode into office full of confidence. The Chief Constable was an ex Indian Army Colonel, a huge man with f erocious eyebrows. No one dare go against him or his commands, he was boss in every sense of the word. I waited to go in, once in the office he told me to sit down which was a rarity. He said, "Papworth I am transferring you to Fletton police station near Peterborough next week, so you had better get some digs". That was the end of the conversation.

FLETTON

My dad gave me a car on demob so I could travel around easily, and found some lodgings in Fletton, near the London Brick Company sports centre. I was to be snapped up by the L.B.C and opened bowling for them for several years. Back at work after having leave I was seen by Chief Inspector Mr Mills; I became converse with all that was expected of me and gained a wealth of knowledge from him. Was attached to an offi cer named Alec Mason, a great guy, from whom I learnt a lot. All of the brickyards came with our beat area and the local hostel was within this area and was run by an Italian man called Stephen, who was our biggest informant about illegal activities. I ha d a routine regular beat, getting to know the residents and shopkeepers very well and would inform us if anything was going off in the crime scene. We took turns in patrol cars and in the office at monthly intervals. I enjoyed the cars which was often eng aged with dealing with RTAs, as we had the most road traffic accidents in the area . One of the jobs that called for the utmost tact was informing people who had lost loved ones of their deaths. Once I attended one of these incidents, where the lady of the house remarked "silly old fool was his girlfriend with him, he deserved what he got". In utter surprise I walked out, not the response I was expecting. For whatever reason I do not know I found myself applying for a transfer to Hertfordshire police force and was posted to Welwyn Garden city.

WELWYN GARDEN CITY

WGC was a small town boasting two pubs The Woodman and The Cherry Tree which were located within a population of workers to work in the town's industrial estates, firms included Shredded Wheat , State Express, Scars dale and Fine Fare. Trouble used to brew on a Friday night at The Cherry Tree pub when it was visited by a gang from London Elephant and Castle creating mayhem. With this incident all weapons were confiscated, and this seemed to pacify them for the time being, then a plan was formulated to confiscate everything that could be used as


a weapon such as rings, combs, and even false teeth. This cured the problem and Welwyn did not seem popular for future visits. The Woodman also got a reputation for gambling, when we raided the pub, it was owned by a relative of mine, an ex-Guards RSM. In private I hell of a time making an explanation because I did not have one, in the end I think he believed what I told him.

BIRMINGHAM

Once again I was on the move choosing another force-Birmingham City, what an experience, to be sworn in as a constable in the morning and married in the afternoon, just a one day honeymoon as I had to go to the Police College for training for a fortnight, then back pounding the streets of Birmingham for the rest of my police service. It was the annual athletic event at Birchfields Stadium, and I was put down to enter the high jump which I won, jumping six feet and the prize was a cut glass vase which I still own today. Then I was sent to London's White City stadium, where I appeared before H.M.The Queen but I failed to reach the standard required maybe because I was nervous. I got nowhere except for a day never to be forgotten. I did not worry I still had cricket and football which I loved and the Midland Police high jump record. Not forgetting the cut glass vase. Well back to normal and every day beat duties and monitoring traffic in the second biggest city in the country. It comprised of half of the city centres A division controlling traffic, sticking pieces of brown paper onto parked car tyres. The idea being that the paper would be indented the tyre proving if the car had been moved or not. It obviously did not work, as the paper fell off, there was no evidence. Evidence in law terms is used to indicate any fact or point in issue or question which may be proved in a legal manner complying with the laws governing the subject. So, it is split into either hearsay or circumstantial and from that a court presentation takes place. We had regular fights break out, especially on a Friday evening when several small incidents led to a major one. We know when to enter and deal with this. The stairs were very narrow and hard to man handle any one down, many of the fighters ran off, but the police did not bother to chase them. I then left Birmingham and joined the prison service. Enjoyed my 30 years in the various services, climbing the ladder of my various ranks, in the promotion to higher management, I would not have changed it for anything else.









The story of Rolls-Royce begins with the motor car but not in Derby but in Manchester where Henry Royce (later Sir Henry Royce) had built up a company called F H Royce & Co which made electrical equipment and overhead cranes. Henry Royce's first experiences with motor car occurred when he brought his first in 1902 and his experiences with it led him to develop his own car in 1904.


The 'Rolls' in Rolls-Royce refers to the Hon Charles Stewart Rolls who too had his own company C S Rolls & Co Ltd which sold motor cars in London. C S Rolls was looking to sale a quality British car and this lead to meeting, arranged by mutual friend Harry Edmunds in May 1904, with Royce in Manchester. At the meeting an agreement was reached where Royce's cars would be sold exclusively by C S Rolls and badged as Rolls-Royce. History was starting to be made and it is the success of the car business which leads the story to Derby...

Rolls-Royce Limited was formally formed in 1906 and sales of cars progressed well with particularly as the 20/40HP, which became popularly known the 'Silver Ghost'. With the success the premises of F H Royce & Co in Cooke Street, Manchester where the cars were being made became too small and expansion was needed. A search for a new place to call home is always difficult with a number of considerations and Rolls-Royce was no different and after various places were considered, including Leicester, it was Derby that emerged as the new home. Derby offered some great advantages it had good transport links, a skilled workforce (as result of the already existing industries of foundries and the railway works) Osmaston Park area offered the land needed and Derby itself assisted with incentives. Derby was now the home of Rolls-Royce new site on what was to become Nightingale Road popularly known as Main Works.

The coming of the First World War in August 1914 changed many lives including the direction of Rolls-Royce. At the start of the war Rolls-Royce started making for the war effort a small numbers of 40/50Hp chassis for use by the Army alongside munitions but it was the aero engine that was really to become the mainstay of the business during this period. In 1914 there was considerable lack of British aero engines that were suitable for the aircraft of the time and war meant there was now a real need. Rolls-Royce in Derby responded by first making the Renault A14 engine under licence but Henry Royce was not satisfied with this and designed his own engine, and Rolls-Royce's first, the Eagle.

The Eagle, which was largely manufactured and tested at Main Works in Derby was based on Royce's experience of designing car engines. It used a twelve cylinder water cooled design based on V- angled platform, a design that became the model for many Royce's following designs. The Eagle powered many aircraft in the First World War including the Airco DH.9 and Handley Page 0/400. The engine also has the distinction of powering Alcock & Brown's famous Vickers Vimy on the first transatlantic flight and powering the first flight to Australia from Britain both in 1919. As the war developed there was need for smaller and bigger engines this lead to the Hawk, Falcon and Condor being developed. The Falcon was famously used in the Bristol Fighter F2B popularly known as the 'Brisfit'. Its workforce swelled considerably over the war standing at some 8000 by the wars end.

Peace came in November 1918 and although of course universally welcomed its timing came as quite shock and there was obvious need for some reduction in staff as the company sought to adjust to the new world.

In the early 1920's there was little development on aero engines as there was limited finance around, however it was decided to launch a smaller car model, which became the 20hp while the Silver Ghost continued to

be produced until 1925 when it was superseded by the Phantom I. Under Royce's direction in 1927 a new aero engine emerged the "F" (later known as Kestrel) and in 1928 this was followed by "H" engine which became the Buzzard. Derby at this time still remained home of aero engine production at an expanded Main Works site alongside the motor cars.

In the of the 1920's Rolls-Royce aero development started to move up a gear with Rolls-Royce's emotive involvement in the Schneider Trophy Air Races, which captured the imagination of nations involved towards the end of 1920's and early 1930's. Schneider Trophy Air Races were held on water and named after French aviation pioneer Jacques Schneider. Under the rules of the race any competitor who won the race three times out of five could keep the trophy – the race was on.

For Rolls-Royce the race started in 1929 with the Supermarine S.6, designed by the eponymous R J Mitchell of Supermarine, powered by the newly developed 1,900hp R Engine designed by Royce and his team. It won and this was the second successive British win, the 1927 race being won by a British Supermarine S.5 powered by a Naiper Lion engine.




CS Rolls at work in his office. Rolls was killed in 1910 in an air crash.



The 1931 race saw the same R engine's power raised to 2,350hp which in the Supermarine S.6B won the race and the trophy outright for Great Britain.


Although Sir Henry Royce died in 1933 and with his death one of the last links to the founders was removed; the R engine that Sir Henry and team developed became the bases for the extremely successful Merlin engine so associated with Supermarine Spitfire, Hawker Hurricane and Avro Lancaster alongside many other aircraft types.

Memorial Window


Not in the quiet hush of dim cathedral,
